Research indicates that providers routinely modify interventions in routine care settings (Cook et al., 2014; Stirman et al., 2013a). However, little is known about the impact of the changes that are made. The focus of this presentation will be to differentiate between modifications and adaptations to evidence-based interventions, to describe challenges to examining the impact of modifications and adaptations on implementation and intervention-level outcomes, to introduce a framework for classifying modifications and adaptations (Stirman et al., 2013b), and to demonstrate methods for making these classifications.
